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Local History Preserved

One of the pioneer homes in Lacey, the Ullery House. has been replaced by the new Lacey Albertsons store, located at 6100 Pacific Avenue S. E., in Lacey.

In preserving local history, Albertsons invited local dignitaries and members of the Ullery family to attend the unvailing of a placque showing a picture of the Ullery house and a little of its history.

Shana Stevenson, of the Thurston County Historical Society, did the unvailing and told of the Ullery's contribution to this area, introduced two members of the Ullery family and others present: Representing the Lacey Historical Society were Tom Huntamer, President and Dick Webb, Secretary; representing the City of Lacey: City Manager, Greg Cuoio, City Mayor, Gene Liddell, City Parks Dept. Mgr., Jim Sheler, Richard Cobb, Dept. of Public Works; State Representative, Karen Fraser; Representing Albertsons: S. W. (Woody) Harris, Real Estate Mgr. Western Washington Division, and Barbara Baird, Store Manager; plus many interested citizens.

The Albertsons new Lacey store had its ribboncutting ceremony and opening Sept, 30, 1992 at 9:00 a.m.

Plants and Trees Tagged and Indexed

Every year since 1986, The Lacey Historical Society has sponsored a Tree Planting at the Lacey Museum allowing anyone desiring to do so to donate a tree or plant and dedicate it to a family member or special friend. A marker has now been placed by each plant, giving the name of the plant, the donor, and to whom dedicated. To be of further help, the museum has also indexed this information along with the location of each plant so each can easily be found.

Of special note: One of the donated pear trees is already bearing fruit!

House for Sale

During the latter part of 1991, the L.H.S. Board of Trustees authorized the acceptance of a residential building as a gift from the Johnny Lewis family. The gift was made on the condition that the building be moved to make room for the new Albertson's store at the corner of Pacific Avenue and Carpenter Road. The Boardarranged for the purchase of property located on the Mesplay road and had the house moved to that location in December 1991.

The objective of the Board in taking on the project was to further the long range goal to develop a Children's Museum at the site of its existing properties near the Lacey Museum. The Society will direct the proceeds of the sale of the donated property to that purpose.

Extensive work was required to bring the house up to standard for sale, including a new foundation, roof, plumbing, utility services, insulation, new decks and porches, paint and landscaping.

With the help of several trustees, members at large, and a number of very generous community business donors, the project is near completion at this time and ready for sale. A complete project report and special recognition of the many volunteers and donors who gave generously of their time and materials will be included in the next newsletter.

Mrs. Cunningham worked for North Thurston School District as cook for 20 years at Lacey and Lydia Hawk grade schools. She retired in 1976.


She enjoyed gardening and traveling in the family motorhome.
