## LACEY HISTORY TIME LINE (Cont. from June Newsletter)

1853:	The area's population is further boosted with the arrival of the families of Tyrus and Emeline Himes and Vareen Davis.  Nathan Eaton builds a sawmill on Eaton Creek, the first sawmill in Western Washington not on the sound.  The community forms a school district.  Eliza Jane, the young wife of Urban East Hicks, dies.  Stephen Ruddell puts aside land for a cemetery, which becomes known as the Pioneer Cemetery.
1854:	John Hawk and his family settle near the Tyrells.  Tyrell's Prairie becomes known as Hawks Prairie.
1855:	The Indians rise up against the settlers in protest over the forced loss of land. The settlers build stockades on various homesteads, including the Ruddell property, the Hawk property, and the Eaton Property.
1856:	William White is killed near Fort Eaton. By summer, hostilities have ceased.
1881:	By this year the area's school has moved to the former Wood Donation Land Claim and is known as Wood School District #10.
1890:	John M. Adams plats "Adams Acres Tracts adjoining Olympia," the oldest plat now within the Lacey City limits.

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### THE REMEMBERING PLACE

Do you remember we have been working towards the construction of a memorial called, "The Remembering Place"?

This is an Eagle Scout project for Dan Healy, of Boy Scout Troop #211. He has worked with Olympia PreCast to obtain the three main pieces (birdbath, bench, and podium); the City of Lacey Public Works to provide the concrete base and approval for placement on the Museum grounds; and the three purchasers, who are honoring their loved ones.

Presently, the bench (for Juanita Hicks) and the podium (for Tom Huntamer) are in place on the Museum grounds. The bird-bath (for Emma Robbins) is waiting for its cement base to be poured.

The remaining piece needed to finish "The Remembering Place" is the map to be placed on top of the podium. The map will present the locations of the 100-plus trees and shrubs that the Society has dedicated since 1986.

The map is also an Eagle Scout project being done by Sung Lee of Boy Scout Troop #208. We are working with Winsor Corporation of Olympia to create a professional and vandal-proof botanical-design outdoor map.

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#### MEETING NEWS

The 100 year old Gallagher House has been in need of basic maintenance. This summer, the Board of Trustees went through the bid process to select a contractor for this work.

Rick Phillips, of Wildwood Construction, was selected to complete the four main repairs. Mr. Phillips was able to start work on the Gallagher House on September 16, 1996.
