


April 13, 2000: Rainy Day Fire

Bessie Miller (Yates) - June 2

Bessie's memory will be honored and lovingly remembered with the proposed use of the donations that have been made to the Lacey Historical Society.

Bessie's son, Eric E. Lee, wrote to us, "the most vivid memory she shared was riding her horse from the Yates' chicken ranch (Nisqually Middle School) to the Bay (Marvin Road and Hoggum Bay Roads) and not seeing another soul along the way." He continues "It's hard to imagine such a memory now." The Society's September 19th meeting agenda calls for "Discussion" and an "Action Vote" on this memorial to Bessie Miller's life and her contributions to Lacey.

Hazel Huckee (Kyllo) - June 29

Hazel and her husband, Abner, were beloved owners of the Gallagher House. The Lacey Historical Society purchased it in the 80's. It is registered #3 on the City of Lacey's Historic Register. There is a plaque located at the front steps of the house which can be seen when visiting the Lacey Museum on Lacey Street.

The Huckee's picturesque flower gardens greeted travelers on Carpentar Road (during the Summer time). In their memory, The Lacey Historical Society will create a new garden site similar to one of theirs. Many citizens of Lacey can recall their purchases of fresh, beautiful bouquets grown by this Lacey couple.


