

A year or so after loaning me the book, Mary asked for it back. I searched my book shelf and the house, but no book. "Mary" I said, "I must have returned it." Our mother, Jewell Earl lived in Sequim near me in her last years. After she was gone, it was up to me to sort through her things. Mothers Memorabilia

I am descended from the Ruddell family and the Himes family who settled here in the 1850's. My mother's maiden name was Ruddell and she loved and shared many stories, books and pictures about her "Lacey Pioneer Ancestors."

Ten years ago my Mother passed away and as her oldest child and trustee I had her property to take of. I had kept several boxes of her pictures and books and it is time I to do something with them. I thought I would pass on the ideas and solutions suggested to me.

Any loose pictures of other family members were put in an envelope and sent to that family, (weddings, graduations, birthdays, reunions etc).

Photo books were given to other family members so they could take what had meaning to them. Some duplicated the photos from the books or just took the page they wanted. They then passed them on and the last one to see them disposed of the books. Former organizations and friends were also given an opportunity to see them and take pictures.

Since I have genealogy books of our family, I made a one-page collage of her pictures (mostly her face from baby on) and included it with her family record.

I also made a page of newspaper articles and stories about her. Slides and tapes can be made onto DVDs by commercial means or by you, (if you understand and have the equipment). I had over 3,000 of my slides put on 5 DVDs by Costco and I'm really pleased with them.

Most legal records and accounts can be destroyed after 10 years but I have kept a few for our Family History. Books can be given to organizations that have libraries such as schools and churches or sold at yard sales and rummage sales. Some, like school annuals and personal trip books, just have to be disposed of... Goodwill or other organizations will also take books.



LOOKING FORWARD TO THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY

DID YOU KNOW?....the reason "Why" the Lacey Historical Society began their "Memorial Plantings?" In 1986 when the city wanted to recognize its 20th anniversary, we celebrated over the three-day weekend in October. Beginning on Friday, the first Lacey City Council meeting was reenacted in the Lacey Museum (Lacey's first City Hall). Several original councilmen were present. Anna Homann did the honors for her deceased husband, Lacey's first Mayor Al Homann. Dick Web read the first treasurer's report, noting that the City had \$9.27 in its account. Saturday the focus was on the South Sound Shopping Center. Bob Blume had brought a major shopping center to Lacey in 1966. Sunday, the Lacey Historical Society invited the Lacey community to an afternoon rose planting event in honor of Mayor Al Homann and Creighton Hayes with Homann's favorite yellow rose and Hayes' petite "Lucky Lady" like the one he always wore in his lapel.

From that day on, the Society honors its first and current citizens with plantings around the museum and the adjacent historical Gallagher house. The 125 plantings remind us of our past. As we did in 1986, we plan to celebrate the City of Lacey's 50th Anniversary in 2016. - SHIRLEY DZIEDZIC





The Russell Farmhouse

The building that we know now as the Lacey Museum started life along today's Pacific Avenue in 1926 as the home of Fred and Minnie Russell. An article in the February 16, 1926 issue of the Morning Olympian described it in glowing terms and mentioned that it stood just to the west of the Russells' gas station and confectionary store. Unfortunately for the Russell family, mounting debts caused them to lose it just a few years later. Subsequent owners included E.J. Johnson, Clara Rohde and the Jordans.

During the 1950's because of its ideal location in the burgeoning community of Lacey, the building served as the home of Lacey Fire District #3. Following the city's incorporation in December 1966, that same ideal location appealed to the new city government and it became City Hall.

An article from the Olympian dated 1986 recounts the history from there: "The City of Lacey was incorporated in 1966, but has a past dating back to the 1800's. From 1940 to the 1960's, a farmhouse built in 1922 by Fred and Minnie Russell housed the Lacey Fire Department and the Lacey Police Department. It also served as Lacey City Hall. The Russell homestead was located on Pacific Avenue. When the city incorporated, the city offices were moved into portable buildings and the Fire Department relocated adjacent to the farmhouse. The Police Department (see photo) remained in the Russell farmhouse along with resident firefighters who were housed upstairs.

By 1979, the building was vacated since a new City Hall had been constructed on College Street on the grounds of St. Martin's College. The building had housed a number of city offices over the years and had become a large part of Lacey's history. As growth progressed, citizens were becoming concerned that many of the fragile ties to the past were being lost due to the rapid development of the area. Residents encouraged the city to preserve the structure as a museum. The City Council created the Lacey Historical Commission to develop a historic program for the city which included a museum. As a result, the Lacey Women's Club donated land on Lacey Street for the new location of the Russell farmhouse. Restoration of the future museum began and was scheduled for completion in five years.

The outpouring by the community was incredible with donations of time, money and support. Initially, the city received a \$50,000 federal grant from CETA (the Comprehensive Education and Training Act). By the time the museum was finished, civic groups, businesses and individuals had contributed over \$20,000 in funds and materials. With much community pride, the Lacey Museum was completed in one year! In September 1980 the museum was dedicated and the keys were formally turned over to the City of Lacey. Since its dedication, the Lacey Museum has been the site of many local gatherings. The outstanding commitment of Lacey residents to the creation of this Museum will always be a reminder of the value of ties to the past which help define the present and balance our future."
