


# Lacey School Days Reunion




8th Grade Class 1948-1949

Not only are they a source of enjoyment, they also provide a lasting source of understanding Lacey's history.



#### The Hunt for O.C. Lacey Continues....

When I started working at the Lacey Museum in 1993, one of my first tasks was to find out more about the alleged source of the name of our city, O.C. Lacey. Earlier articles on him declared that there was little information available. Over the next few years, I researched old newspapers and government documents and uncovered a wealth of information during his days in Olympia (1889-1896). What I found was that most of what had been written on him prior to then was based on myth and conjecture. What I did not find was the reason for his name being assigned to the post office and subsequently to the community. Nor did I find much about his life prior to coming to Washington state or what happened to him after he left despite some effort on my part. In 1996, I wrote an essay for the museum based on my findings to that point.

Obviously back then I did not have the internet as a resource. Because the mystery remains, several other people have taken up the search as more information has become available. They include former museum curator Amber Raney, Steve Kirkman with the city's Public Affairs dept, historian Deb Ross and current museum curator Erin Quinn-Valcho. The common assumption is that Lacey returned to Virginia his state of birth and indeed Erin has uncovered his obituary in a newspaper from Hampton, VA. She also found him under "Find-a-Grave". However, the picture was the entire Oakland Cemetery in Hampton, VA, not a grave. Recently I had the opportunity to visit the Oakland Cemetery. As with most things to do with Mr. Lacey, there are annoying complications. The cemetery is privately owned and the owner has neglected to pay his taxes. It is not being cared for, nor are there any records of interment. And you may have guessed by now, there is no grave for O.C. Lacey. I did find some other information during my visit to Virginia, which I hope to share at the annual meeting, but the hunt for O.C. Lacey is not over.

#### Yates Family

Edward (Teddy) and Margaret Yates immigrated to the U.S. from Manchester, England in 1900 & settled in Roslyn, Wash. Grandpa Yates was a coal miner in Manchester & then in Roslyn, Wash. They had 4 children, Peter, Margaret (Bessie), Harold and one baby that froze to death in her crib.

Because of the crib death, in 1917 Edward and Margaret bought 36 acres on the Steilacoom Rd in Thurston County where they moved to in 1919 and started a chicken ranch. During the Depression, they lived by having a huge garden and greenhouse. Aunt Bessie owned and ran a small grocery store in Lacey at the corner of Pacific Ave. and Carpenter Rd.

They put 3 kids through Lacey Grade School and Olympia High School. Uncle Pete went on to college at WSC and graduated in engineering. He eventually moved to Puyallup and bought a 22 acre raspberry farm.

In 1932, the Miller brothers in Tacoma and the Simpsons in Shelton lost their egg-man. They came to Grandpa Yates and asked if he would deliver eggs to them. Grandpa turned them down but said his youngest son Harold (my dad) could do the job.

Dad bought a small home on Hicks Lake (100 ft frontage and 510 feet deep) on Carpenter Rd in what is now Lacey and built an egg processing plant on that property. When I got married in 1960, dad had to increase his business from small grocery stores to small supermarkets, state institutions, Fort Lewis, and McChord Commissaries. He also had to contract with bigger farms to get more eggs. So that's a brief history of my family.

## Lacey's 50th Anniversary Kick-off Party

Lacey's Independence Day celebration was explosive in many ways! The 50th edition of the annual July 3 Fireworks Spectacular was located for the first time in beautiful Rainier Vista Community Park, and the event was the kick-off party for the year-long celebration of <u>Lacey's Golden Anniversary of incorporation as a city.</u>

More than 5,000 citizens gathered at the park and enjoyed a concert featuring the Blackberry Bushes String Band followed by British Export, a Beatles tribute band. The pseudo John, Paul, George and Ringo had the all-ages crowd happily singing and dancing to songs from the 60s!

As the crowd rollicked, a small plane circled overhead, and four skydivers jumped towards the festivities: two trailing blue and red smoke, one carrying a Lacey 50th Anniversary banner, and the final jumper descending with a large American flag. All landed on target in the park to the delight of the thousands of spectators. When darkness came, the crowd settled in and watched an incredible fireworks display which beautifully honored Lacey's historical tradition and loudly declared the commencement of *Lacey's 50th Anniversary celebration*.

#### Lacey in the Early 1970s

In comparing today's Lacey to 40 years ago, one would find the streetscape along Sleater-Kinney Rd, Pacific Avenue and Lacey Boulevard quite changed. Buildings have been added or remodeled due to a change of business.

Sleater-Kinney had only one fast-food establishment - Eagan's Lacey Big Tom Drive Inn. By 1976, Albertsons had opened a new store (now site of Office Depot). On that same east side, where Fred Meyer is now, was Market Square with small businesses as Bailey Drugs. Further south was the U.S. Post Office with limited parking.

On the west side was South Sound Center. Northgate Mall, in the north end of Seattle, had opened in the 1950s without a cover, so shopping here in an enclosed mall was pleasant year-round. People's department store anchored the south end with Sears on the north. Inside at Woolworth's you could find basics or eat at the Red Bull Restaurant with a wide variety of other stores.


The strip mall to the south housed Ernest Hardware, Malmo Nursery, Pay'N'Save and South Sound National Bank. Across the way was Safeway (now Petsmart) with the wonderful view of Mount Rainier to enjoy as you loaded your groceries.

On Lacey Blvd near College Street, the Lacey Library relocated into the former Coast to Coast Hardware Store. Amazingly the library staff was able to maximize its space for many years.

This is just a brief remembrance of the 1970s. For the up-coming annual meeting, consider sharing your remembrances.





In a changing community, the Lacey Museum works to preserve and interpret Lacey history and identity. Through exhibits, educational programs, and research archives, the museum tells the story of Lacey's past, present and future.

**Becoming A Museum:** The Lacey Museum is located in a historic structure that was originally built in 1926 by Fred Russell as a private residence on Pacific Avenue. In the late 1940's the building was used by the Lacey Volunteer Fire Department. After Lacey incorporated as a city in 1966, it became the first city hall. Eventually city government outgrew the building. By 1979 the decision was made to create a local museum on land donated by the Lacey Women's Club. The old city hall was moved from Pacific Ave. to its current location on Lacey Street. In 1981 the Lacey Museum opened to the public.

**Preserving and Interpreting Lacey's History:** The Lacey Museum works in many ways to preserve and interpret local heritage. The Museum collects and cares for historical photographs, objects, and documents related to Lacey history. They are kept at the museum, and available by appointment to researchers.

In addition, the Museum installs changing exhibits at the Lacey Timberland Library, Lacey City Hall, special events, and at the Museum. Past displays have included Union Mills, Remembering Fort Nisqually, the Huntamer Family, and Lacey Place Names.

Museum staff regularly give presentations on local history, regional anthropology and conservation techniques to school classes, community organizations and other groups. Please call the Museum for scheduling. These programs are free and open to the public.
